This program allows the division to invite the very best pediatric surgeons from around the world to share their knowledge about the most advanced surgical procedures for children with UF residents and faculty.

Dr. Brad W. Warner is currently the Apolline Blair Professor of Surgery at Washington University School of Medicine and the Surgeon-in-Chief at the St. Louis Children's Hospital. Dr. Warner is a native of St. Louis and completed college and medical school at the University of Missouri-Kansas City School of Medicine's six-year medical program. In 1982, he moved to the University of Cincinnati whereby he completed a general surgery residency, a two-year research fellowship, and a fellowship in pediatric surgery. He stayed on faculty at the Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center and University of Cincinnati College of Medicine whereby he rose in the ranks to full professor. He has an NIH-funded basic science laboratory and has been Program Director for the Pediatric Surgery Fellowship in Cincinnati, as well as Director of Surgical Research. Dr. Warner came to St. Louis Children's Hospital in 2007. He has an active laboratory at Washington University with multiple surgical residents, PhD's, and predoctoral and postdoctoral students working in the lab. Dr. Warner's clinical interests include short gut syndrome, ulcerative colitis, and advanced gastrointestinal surgery.
